## SUMMER TIME IS READING TIME

### **Parents Foster a Love of Reading**

Reading aloud to their children.

Permitting children to read before sleep can be a reward- a story allows the child to go to sleep one-half hour later than normal bedtime.

Allowing the child to select his/her own reading material for this reading time. Children will expand their interests as their reading improves.

Having children read stories as they listen to a tape of the same story.

### **Model reading by turning off the TV and reading for pleasure.**

This is often cited as the most important factor influencing children's reading habits.

Check with your local library about their summer reading program. Sign up!

### Suggestions for Improving Comprehension

1. Set a purpose for reading by asking questions before reading a selection.
2. After reading:
  - Have your child summarize the important ideas verbally or in writing.
  - Find the story elements (characters, setting (where and when), and plot.
  - Look for meanings that are hidden between the lines.
3. Use SQ3R Method to study the factual material.
  - SURVEY – read only the headlines, captions and summaries.
  - QUESTION – ask Who, What, Where, When and Why questions.
  - READ – read to find the answers to your questions.
  - RECITE – write and study the answers to your questions.
  - REVIEW
4. Keep a vocabulary file box or notebook. Add new words daily. Challenge your child to use 3 new words a day in their conversation.
5. Keep up with current events. Read the paper and discuss what is happening.
6. Provide experiences that will help your child build a background of information.
7. ENJOY A BOOK WITH YOUR CHILD!
